## **Deborah Silver**

Deborah Silver is a native of Cleveland, Ohio. She discovered her love of weaving while attending the Cleveland Institute of Art, attaining a BFA as a Fiber major and Drawing minor.

After a weaving internship, Deborah learned the craft of antique furniture upholstery. She then combined her skills to open her own fiber art

business, working closely with interior designers, creating sitespecific fiber commissions for private residences, businesses, and religious institutions.

Currently, Deborah designs and weaves pieces using the split-shed technique, transforming traditional patterns into a signature method of handweaving. All weft yarns travel from selvedge to selvedge, differentiating this cloth from tapestry. Her works have been inspired by the increased cross-culturalism in the world which has been facilitated by technology, the ancient realm of road and trade, now advanced to hyperspeed. Her most recent art is drawn from the memorial structures found in old cemeteries.

Deborah teaches split-shed weaving workshops internationally. In 2019, she published *The Technique of Split-shed Weaving*, a book that illustrates pictorial weaving using the split-shed process on four-shaft looms. Her articles have been published in Complex Weavers magazine.

### Day Presentation: My Creative Journey

Deborah will discuss her creative journey: how she came to be a weaver, created textiles for interiors, and incorporated split-shed weaving into her work. She will present the creative process and philosophy that she employs in her weavings. She will also explain the split-shed weaving technique.

### **Evening Presentation: The Split Shed Rabbit Hole**

Deborah will discuss her research into weave structures and how she modified dozens of 4- and 8-shaft patterns so that one can weave curves on only 4-shafts using a split-shed. She will explain the split-shed weaving process and how she has integrated various split-shed structures into her art and craftwork.

## 🔔 2024 Rules & Regulations

Each year the Rules & Regulations document is reviewed and updated. It is important to read the entire document to more easily participate in the Show & Sale.

#### Member Eligibility - Shift Requirements

• Shift requirements are determined by the number of items or total dollar amount of inventory.

#### Standards of Acceptance - Readiness for Sale

- All unspun fiber, other than braided top/roving, must be entirely contained and packaged in a way that cannot easily be opened on the sales floor (professional sales bags preferred, but new, clean ziplock bags acceptable). Inclusion of a small fiber sample neatly and securely attached to the outside of the packaging is acceptable. Staples are not allowed.
- Care and Content Tags all items, other than single use items, must have appropriate care and content clearly labeled to be accepted at Check-In. This must include any non-fiber items or components.
- Necklaces and bracelets should state a length measurement, including in the ADE inventory description and appear on the ADE label/tag at Check-In.
- All packaging/framing must be new, clean, and professional in appearance.
- All Showcase entries must meet all Show & Sale Rules and Regulations, Standards, and Readiness for Sale requirements and be complete at the time of submission. Works in progress are not eligible.
- Adult themes and language are disallowed on Sale items.
- Embroidery/Stitching Technique Significant amount of handstitched decoration using a needle to apply thread and other materials to fabric.
- **Tags** The holes in the tags should be round. Tags should be fresh, clean and at least the size and weight of a standard 2" x 3.5" business card.
- Any non-fiber item or component content label must include all ingredients, including fiber-encased soap.
- Jewelry and other small items all display cards should be wellmade and sturdy enough to support the item while freestanding or leaned in a basket.

#### Artist Data Entry Program - ADE

- Unique inventory number each item must be entered into ADE and receive a unique inventory number.
- **Barcode labels** must be in the format printed by the Artist Data Entry program.
- Inventory Sheets must be printed from the ADE program. Screen captures and images are not acceptable.

#### **Advisories and Friendly Reminders**

- The Show & Sale is moving away from the use of sawtooth hangers and glass for wall mounted art in order to protect the art. Consider moving to invisibly wired hangers for wall art going forward.
- Wall hangings must have appropriate and professional quality hanging hardware already installed so they can immediately be hung in the Sale, and the customer can easily hang at home.

# Help Wanted

The Sale Technology Committee has a great opportunity for a new volunteer for the position of Sale Computer Hardware Manager!

### **Responsibilities include:**

- Update software & firmware on sale computers (Microsoft, etc.) as needed
- Work with guild treasurer to make sure credit card processor is activated for the sale, and closed after the sale
- Ensure all hardware is working prior to sale
- Keep digital inventory of equipment up to date including location of equipment
- Responsible for equipment setup for trainings and sale

This position is an important part of the Sale Technology Committee. Support and training are available for someone who is interested in learning new skills.

Benefits include flexible volunteer hours (this position is a great position for someone who works full-time) & 10 shift credits for the sale.

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## Classes at Lamms End Studio in Fort Collins



June 1-2, 2024: Dive into the Wonderful World of Hemp with Michele Belson, coowner of Lunatic Fringe Yarns! Explore the properties of this ancient fiber and discover its incredible properties firsthand. Cost: \$160 Materials fee: \$35 for all yarn.

In this immersive class you'll experience hemp's diversity by sampling different yarns. Weave six washcloths, each with a different hemp yarn.

Use either a harness loom or a Rigid Heddle Loom. Michele will provide pre-wound warps for harness looms and 8/2 cotton to warp your Rigid Heddle looms, so you'll also get some great

tips and tricks for warping either kind of loom in addition to weaving with hemp! Don't have a loom? No worries. Rigid Heddle and shaft looms are available for rent. Students need a 12-dent reed. Lamms End has a number of 12-dent reeds for shaft looms.

#### Ice and Muck Dyeing on Zoom with Natalie Drummond

May be done at your place or in studio Cost \$150 plus a materials fee August 17-18, 10 am-3 pm



Day 1: Participants will start their day with a presentation learning about ice dye methods, fiber reactive dyes, dyes that split heavily, and the many variables that effect results on plant-based fibers. Various ideas will be presented about how to use the leftover muck to dye mini-skeins to bring harmony to a weaving project.

Participants will mix dyes/soda ash for recommended dyes that split to test on paper towels or 5" x 5" pre-washed cotton squares with a mister! Learn how to set up your shallow tubs to test additional fabric samples as well as up to three previously wound warps of cotton and/or Tencel for color repeats. Recording your methods and variables is important if you want to repeat your dyeing on your own following the workshop!

Day 2: Participants will start their day with a presentation learning about how to use the leftover muck

from Day 1 for a pre-wound warp or cotton or Tencel and mini skeins. Natalie presents four different options for participants to use a rack to introduce the effect of gravity which produces different results from muck ice dyeing. Learn how to design a repeat of your warp yarn and how substituting an additional color during application can add to the palette of colors in the resulting yarn.

Disposal of dyes and weaving applications will also be reviewed with participants!

**Color Lab**: One day workshop emphasizing weaving value and hue selection and how to work with multiple painted warps in four- or eight-shaft deflected doubleweave patterns. I share my approach with color for blocks as well as color placement within the same block of the draft I am teaching. Participants are asked to share yarns they are considering using

following initial instruction.

how to customize your weaving project by adding and building color into your pre-warped looms following value and color studies of dyed warps. J

often refer to this as my color lab! -A two-day weaving workshop reviewing basic Deflected Doubleweave structure and behavior after sampling. How do weavers address those wonky selvedges? Learn the basics of the "shuttle diving technique" for 4 to 8 shafts. Mixing fibers for optimal deflection and/or differential shrinkage are explored for draft(s) I am currently teaching as they play an important part in the draft you are weaving. Simple treadling designs are introduced in each sample so participants can determine how the block structure of this weave can be organized to produce their own woven project - a scarf or runner with remaining warp following sampling. Explore different washing and finishing methods to determine appropriate

deflection/differential shrinkage. Day 2 begins with a collaborative discussion of workshop samples prior to weaving the remaining warp.
